Registration Fees:

Based on the availability of funds, the MFN will provide assistance funding for the chosen Sport or Activity's registration fees up to a maximum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per youth calendar year (April 1 to March 31).

Procedures:

- > The parent/guardian must bring in the completed funding application either before or after the start date of the activity.
- The completed funding application must be accompanied by either a receipt and or completed registration form for chosen activity.
- No cheques will be issued without the proper paper work filled out, which included the funding application, registration forms and or receipts.

Next Level: Provincials or equivalent

Based on the availability of funds, the MFN will provide assistance funding for those youth that succeed in their chosen Sport or Activity and are selected to participate at the Provincials or equivalent level. The MFN will assist with travel cost to a maximum of One Hundred & Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) per youth, per activity, per calendar year (April 1 to March 31)

Procedures:

- The parent/guardian must bring in the completed funding application either before the start date of the activity.
- > The completed funding application must be accompanied documentation showing the child has been chosen to participate at the Provincial level or equivalent in their chosen activity.
- No cheques will be issued without the proper paper work filled out, which includes the funding application, registration forms and or receipts.

Next level: Nationals or equivalent

Based on the availability of funds, the MFN will provide assistance funding for those youth that succeed in their chosen Sport or Activity and are selected to participate at the Nationals or equivalent level. The MFN will assist with travel costs to a maximum of

Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) per youth, per activity, per calendar year (April 1 to March 31st)

Procedures:

- > The parent/guardian must bring in the completed funding application either before the start date of the activity.
- ➤ The completed funding application must be accompanied documentation showing the child has been chosen to participate at the Provincial level or equivalent in their chosen activity.
- ➤ No cheques will be issued without the proper paper work filled out, which includes the funding application, registration forms and or receipts.

Next Level: Exceptional / Gifted Level

Based on the availability of funds, the MFN will provide assistance funding for those youth that succeed in their chose Sport or Activity and are selected to participate at the Rep or Competitive level where the training/participation requirements exceed the normal or accepted requirements of their chosen Sport or Activity, the MFN will assist with costs to a maximum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) per youth, per activity, per calendar year (April 1 to March 31st)

Procedures:

- > The parent/guardian must bring in the completed funding application before the start date of the activity.
- ➤ Parents & youth are required to meet with MFN so that they can jointly work together to plan for the child's financial requirements in the sport and or activity they are excelling in.
- > The completed funding application must be accompanied with documentation showing the child has been chosen to participate at the Exceptional or Gifted level or equivalent in their chosen activity.
- ➤ No cheques will be issued without the proper documentation, which includes the funding application, registration forms, letter/documentation reflecting additional/advanced participation requirements, and or receipts.

Team Funding Application:

The MFN will assist with Tournament entrance fee funding to teams that have a minimum of fifty percent (50%) of Mamalilikulla First Nation youth on the team that are looking to participate in a maximum of Two (2) Tournaments per calendar year (April 1 – March 31)

Procedures:

- ➤ The team Coach must fill out an application form and submit the tournament registration forms.
- > There must be a list of all of the Mamalilikulla First Nation participants
- ➤ The MFN Release and Indemnity form must be completed and signed by the parent(s) of each Child that is participating.
- ➤ No cheques will be issued without the proper paper work filled out, which includes the funding application, registration forms and or receipts.

TUITION SPONSORSHIP

If you are being sponsored for your tuition, your band or Aboriginal association will need to fill out a Sponsorship Third-Party Billing Form. Please consult the UBC Okanagan Calendar for tuition fee payment dates and deadlines.

It is your responsibility to pay your tuition and fees on time. If you do not pay your tuition by these dates, you may be placed on financial hold. To pay your tuition fees, you can use any of the methods that you used to pay your acceptance deposit. For more information on paying tuition and fees, please consult the General Information and Policy on Fees section in the UBC Okanagan Calendar.

COURSE OR PROGRAM WITHDRAWAL

If you are withdrawing from your program or course, please make note of course withdrawal information and deadlines. You may withdraw from a course before the withdrawal deadline and avoid an academic penalty (a failing grade). You may still be eligible for a full or partial tuition fee refund if you withdraw before the appropriate withdrawal deadlines. If you wish to withdraw from a course past the deadlines, you should read UBC Okanagan's policy regarding late withdrawals (academic concession) and consult an academic advisor prior to withdrawing. Please be aware that course withdrawals may result in the following consequences:

- Loss of eligibility for student loans and financial aid

TEXTBOOK SPONSORSHIP

If you are being sponsored for your textbooks,

- You may only buy textbooks from the UBC Bookstore located in the ADMIN building.
- You will need to inform the cashier that you are being sponsored because
 they will have a list of how much money you are allowed to spend. Make
 sure you bring your UBCcard ID, otherwise they will not be able to
 process your purchase.
- It is your responsibility to contact your sponsor if your books end up
 costing more money than your sponsor has allotted for you. Ask your
 sponsor if they can cover these costs. If they agree to, they need to
 contact the bookstore again to authorize more money. Or, if it's okay with
 your sponsor, you can buy the books and get reimbursed. If your sponsor
 will not cover the extra costs, you will have to pay for the books yourself.

In remembrance of <u>Thomas Berger</u>, who passed away on April 28, 2021.

Tom was both my friend and mentor.

While much of his life centered around law, he had a wider interest and for me his interest in the education of Indigenous people was a great bonus to my work at UBC.

I arrived at UBC as the director of the Native Indian Teacher Education Program in 1981. I met him almost immediately through his wife, Bev, who was the NITEP Coordinator at the time. All that existed at the time that targeted Indigenous students was the Law Program and NITEP. As we sat and visited one day, he said that more should be happening at UBC to promote a cess and to support Indigenous people and their communities. This led us to meet with then President George Pedersen. He agreed and he struck a committee co-chaired by Tom and

The committee consisted of faculty members and Indigenous community members. In a short time we delivered a report to the president who agreed with the recommendations on how best to have the university serve the students and communities in BC. However, it was a time of fiscal restraint and monies were not available to pursue the recommendation.

A year or more later, Dr. Strangway became UBC president and the fiscal situation had changed. Tom suggested he send a letter to Dr. Strangway advising him about the report before he even arrived here. To our surprise he arranged to have me meet with him at his office the Friday of his first week. At the meeting he spoke of the report and asked if it was a direction we still wished to take. I answered in the affirmative and told him some seed money was promised by the Donner Canadian Foundation if we were to pursue this. His response: "Well go for it".

We formed an advisory committee with Tom as the chair. A concept known as the First Nations House of Learning was the result. Its primary goal was to work with the university as a whole to provide access and to support Indigenous students.

Today, we witness at graduation time, students graduating from many different faculties resulting in expertise to assist our communities on the road to self government. Tom was the key to this movement.

This is probably just one of the stories of $\mathsf{Tom's}$ influence that is not widely known.

His work is done. May he rest in peace.

Verna Kirkness is the founding director of the <u>First Nations House of Learning</u> at UBC, serving from 1987 to 1993. During this time, she led a successful fundraising campaign to build the First Nations Longhouse, an important gathering place for Indigenous students. The Longhouse opened in 1993.

Veronica gathered plants from the temperate zones of the world, including a significant collection of Rhododendrons. It was her vision that created this incredible combination of garden and old growth forest.

Territorial Acknowledgement

Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU) takes its name from the Kwantlen First Nation. We work, study, and live in a region south of the Fraser River which overlaps with the unceded traditional and ancestral lands of the Kwantlen, Musqueam, Katzie, Semiahmoo, Tsawwassen, Qayqayt and Kwikwetlem peoples.

Proudly sharing the name of the Kwantlen First Nation, the word 'Kwantlen' means Tireless Runner, and is reflected in the university's motto: "through tireless effort, knowledge, and understanding." The representation of a wolf and salmon in KPU's Coat of Arms, was created by former KPU Fine Arts student, Brandon Gabriel, nephew of the hereditary Chief of the Kwantlen People, Chief Marilyn Gabriel.

In 2015, KPU appointed its first Elder in Residence, Lekeyten of the Kwantlen First Nation. In his role, Lekeyten supports Indigenous students on their educational journey sharing knowledge, traditions, teachings, and promoting an understanding and respect for Indigenous perspectives, cultures, and values.

Further underscoring the respect and interconnectedness of the university and the First Nation, KPU's Chancellor and President, and Vice Chancellor, have both been given the title and responsibility of Sí:yá:m (Leader) by the Chief of the Kwantlen First Nation.


Society for Students with a Disability (SSD)


Who we are

Eligibility for the Academy of Indigenous Scholars

Indigenous students are encouraged to apply regardless of grade point average. To be eligible for the Academy you must:

- Be an Indigenous student (someone who self-declares as having First Nation status/non-status, Metis or Inuit ancestry)
- Be a first-year or first-time student to Okanagan College, or feel you could benefit from additional supports
- Plan to enroll in at least three courses in each term (3 courses in Fall and 3 courses in Winter)
- Attend an in-person interview with an Aboriginal Services staff member to gauge your willingness and suitability for the program

Apply to Academy of Indigenous Scholars

Interested students can take full advantage of the Academy of Indigenous Scholars by applying to the Academy. Students will receive an email from an Aboriginal Transitions Planner to arrange a meeting after they have submitted their application.

Each student will receive a log book that is meant to help students carry out their own achievement plan. It's up to the student to carry out the plan's recommendations.

Sponsorship

If you are sponsored by your First Nation, Aboriginal organization, employer or government agency, your sponsor must provide a signed letter to Okanagan College. The letter will be used to bill your sponsor. The sponsor letter should contain the following:

- Your full legal name that you are registered with at Okanagan College
- Your student number
- What type of charges the sponsor is willing to pay on your behalf, providing as much detail as possible. These charges could include the nonrefundable tuition deposit, tuition fees, mandatory fees, student association fees, health, dental, books, supplies, material fees or any other billing
- The maximum allowable amount the sponsor is willing to pay per term (if there is a maximum)
